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Welcome and Introduction

Early Years Foundation Stage Profile 2018

In Kent this year, 75.3% of children achieved a Good Level of Development at the end of the Early Years Foundation Stage. This is a slight improvement on 74.4% in 2017 which is good news. Information about how this compares regionally and nationally, plus information about achievement gaps, will follow when this becomes available, typically October/November. In the meantime, thank you and well done to all types of early years and childcare providers in Kent for all that you continue to do in support of Kent's children and families and in pursuit of improved outcomes for children particularly.

New Kent Provider Agreement

The new Kent Provider Agreement has now been issued and you are advised to return your Provider Declarations to Management Information by Friday 12 October, to ensure you continue to receive your Free Early Education funding at the appropriate time.

One of the major changes to the DfE Statutory Guidance is regarding foster carers. Children in foster care will also now be eligible for the Extended Entitlement, providing they meet the age criteria and meet two additional criteria: that this is consistent with the child's care plan and the foster parent is taking up paid employment outside of their fostering role. Foster carers must speak to the child's social worker and complete a 30 Hour application form for foster children. This can be found on the KELSI 30 Hour page.

Department for Education (DfE) research report: Evaluation of the first year of the national rollout of 30 Hours free childcare

This <u>report</u> from the DfE presents the findings from an independent evaluation of the first year of the national rollout of 30 Hours free childcare.

The following government reports have also been published recently:

- Follow-up survey to the 2017 Childcare and Early Years Survey of Parents (CEYSP): A
 follow-up telephone survey of 774 parents of three to four year olds in May-July 2018
 that agreed to be re-contacted following their 2017 CEYSP survey (in January-August
 2017).
- <u>Take-up of Free Early Education Entitlements (FEEE)</u>: This report examines the factors affecting take-up of free early education entitlements (FEEE) through a rapid evidence assessment, regression analysis of existing data on take-up, and qualitative interviews with 21 local authority early years leads, 30 providers and 40 parents of two, three and four year olds who were not taking up FEEE.
- Impact Study on Early Education Use and Child Outcomes up to age four years: The
 second impact report from the Study of Early Education and Development (SEED), a
 longitudinal eight-year study following approximately 6,000 children across England
 from the age of two, through to the end of Key Stage One (age seven).

Free Early Education and Childcare Appeals and Complaints

Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP)

Under EYPP criteria 2,581 children received payment in the summer term 2018. Anecdotal reports from practitioners across the county indicate that providers are using the money in a wide range of ways. Ofsted will ask you how the funding is used and whether you can show improvement in the wellbeing of the children or improved outcomes on their educational outcomes so do be prepared to show your evidence.

Prevent

Recent news has highlighted a setting that had its Ofsted rating lowered from Outstanding to Requires Improvement because of staff failure to spot when youngsters may be at risk of being radicalised by family members or others. Ofsted said 'Not all staff have a secure understanding of how to protect children who may be at risk from extreme behaviours or views and that the provider must ensure all staff use the information gained through training to improve staff knowledge of the 'Prevent' duty and wider safeguarding issues'.

For childcare providers to fulfil the Prevent duty, it is essential that staff can identify children who may be vulnerable to radicalisation and know what to do when they are identified. Protecting children from the risk of radicalisation should be part of childcare providers' wider safeguarding duties. You can build children's resilience to radicalisation by promoting fundamental British Values and enabling them to challenge extremist views. The Early Years Foundation Stage sets standards for learning, development and care for children from 0-5, thereby assisting children's personal, social and emotional development and understanding of the world.

Learning for Early Years Professionals:

- Ensure current policies and procedures in identifying children and young people at risk of radicalisation are effective
- Review and evaluate what more do you need to learn about radicalisation and personal experiences and vulnerabilities that would help increase awareness and support staff and managers to recognise and respond to risk
- Ensure staff feel confident about how to escalate any concerns including where adequate action isn't being taken to safeguard children and how to challenge in the event there is disagreement with another organisation or professional

- Ensure that staff are confident about sharing information
- Ensure staff understand the issues around radicalisation, including skills and knowledge alongside having the confidence to engage in conversations with families about their culture, attitudes and beliefs.

The statutory guidance on the Prevent duty summarises the requirements on childcare providers in terms of four general themes: risk assessment, working in partnership, staff training and IT policies.

Supporting Children in Care (CiC) in Early Years Settings

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

You may have seen a recent article in The Times newspaper (18 August 2018) which discussed a case of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) in relation to a three year old child. While the article does not make for easy reading, it is important that early years and childcare providers understand their duty pertaining to FGM.

Definition:

'Female genital mutilation comprises all procedures involving partial or total removal of the external female genitalia or other injury to the female genital organs for non-medical reasons. It has no health benefits and harms girls and women in many ways. It involves removing and damaging healthy and normal female genital tissue, and hence interferes with the natural function of girls' and women's bodies. The practice causes severe pain and has several immediate and long-term health consequences, including difficulties in childbirth also causing dangers to the child'. World Health Organisation (2014)

FGM is illegal in England, Wales and Northern Ireland as outlined in the Female Genital Mutilation Act 2003. If you know of any cases where FGM has been performed on someone under the age of 18, you <u>must report</u> this to the Police.

If you think a child may have had FGM or you suspect they are at risk, you should follow your own safeguarding procedures, or contact your local safeguarding area education officer.

Signs to look out for:

- Absence: if children are going on 'holiday' towards the end of term, visiting a country of origin. Children may share that all female members of family including aunts and cousins are going on 'holiday'
- An older female family member visiting the UK from a country of origin
- A girl disclosing she is to have a 'special procedure' or that they are attending a special occasion to 'become a woman'
- Difficulty walking, sitting, standing
- Spending longer than normal in the bathroom
- Concerns related to a girl's genitalia during nappy changing
- Difficulties urinating
- Lengthy absences
- Frequent urinary infections
- Behavioural changes e.g. withdrawal, depression upon return to provision
- Asking for help but not explicit about the problem.

This course will support you to reflect on your current offer for children and families with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and enable you to write a 'parent friendly' account of that, using the 12 questions template on the Kent Children and Families Information Service (CFIS) website. This will be your published Local Offer.

The South East Ofsted Big Conversation takes place on the 3 November 2018. This event includes presentations and discussion focusing on Ofsted inspection work, school readiness and best practice. There will also be the opportunity to take part in an open Question and Answer session with Ofsted and to network with other providers.

Ofsted - Curiosity Approach

Ofsted has shared with the local authority that some early years settings in Kent are now adopting the curiosity approach. However, at times there is a lack of knowledge and understanding resulting in elements of unsafe provision because resources are not suitable. The Education People's Threads-of-Success could support you with exploring this approach.

Ofsted Inspection Results

Ofsted do notify the local authority of inspection results and where appropriate and possible an allocated adviser can attend feedback as part of our delivery plan. There is also an outline about Ofsted inspection feedback in the Early Years Inspection Handbook April 2018. We are here to celebrate your success and support you further in your developments.

Meeting staffing requirements in emergencies

Have you considered the following?

Undoubtedly your staff team is your most valuable resource and when you have a staff shortage or if emergency cover is required, this can affect a number of elements. Therefore, when the situation arises 'where do you turn?' to ensure you can still maintain a high quality provision for your children and their families?

We have become aware that when emergency staff shortages arise, some providers have been utilising staff across neighbouring settings and collaborations to ensure ratios are maintained and providers can be fully operational.

To support the sector in offering a seamless service while still maintaining high levels of quality and a safe provision, we have put together some questions to consider:

- How do you ensure your safer recruitment procedures are fully adhered to for **all** staff, including temporary ad/hoc staff?
- How do you ensure **all** practitioners working in your settings are suitable people? (EYFS 2017 sections 3.9- 3.18)
- How do you ensure **all** staff are receiving a robust induction to support their role and responsibilities? (**EYFS section 3.20**)
- Do supervision arrangements include all staff? (EYFS section 3.21) If you
 have a concern about a staff member from another setting, how is this raised
 and dealt with to ensure safeguarding and supervisory arrangements are
 maintained?
- Are safeguarding policies and procedures shared with **all** staff, to ensure they know how to implement **your** procedures?

We recommend that before putting systems in place to share your staff resource, you have a clear and shared understanding of expectations and put processes in place to safeguard yourselves, staff, children and families.

This is a useful link to the DBS guidance for employers.

We are currently developing a protocol to support providers to evaluate if sharing staff meets legal requirements and settings needs.

T-Levels

New opportunities for a career in early years and childcare

The new T-levels for education and childcare will be available to students from 2020. 'T levels' are new technical study programmes that will sit alongside Apprenticeships within a reformed skills training system. The technical option will prepare individuals for skilled employment which requires technical knowledge and practical skills valued by industry.

We are pleased to hear that education and childcare are one of the first levels to be released and that there will be another route for students to join the early years and childcare workforce. We are a diverse workforce with a range of learning styles and backgrounds. It is pleasing to see a wider range of qualifications being made available to meet the needs of learners, while still focusing on the importance of the practical skills, knowledge and behaviours needed in our workforce.

Proposed content for the Education and Childcare T-level

Oh no I'm not creative! – Encouraging loose parts play in the Early Years

The architect Simon Nicholson first coined the phrase 'Loose Parts' in his 1971 article 'How not to cheat children' in which he suggests creativity is for the gifted few and the rest of us live in buildings and communities enjoying art and music created by the gifted few. He goes on to state that we are all creative and no evidence exists to suggest one person is born more creative than another, it is the opportunities we have and the experiences available to us that develop our creativity.

'Loose Parts' are the variables that children interact with enabling them to design, construct, de-construct, manipulate, invent, discover and experience and are perfectly placed to promote the characteristics of effective learning, schematic play and encourage the seven areas of learning and development.

We know from our own experiences that children prefer to play with resources that enthuse and stimulate their curiosity, resources with no fixed agenda that enable the creativity Nicholson suggests we, as adults, have been 'cheated' from. Loose parts provide these opportunities and can encourage a lifelong positive attitude to creativity.

In the early years the right resources coupled with knowledgeable adults with an understanding of their role in supporting loose parts play will provide a generation of creative learners who have in no way been 'cheated' from the fun of designing and building with real materials.

The Education People's Threads of Success provides a variety of training on this topic.
