



- Mental health support for children and adults






Who are KSCMP?

- We are a multi-agency partnership of the three safeguarding partners –
 Local Authority, Police and Health, replacing the previous Safeguarding Board in September 2019.
- The work of the partnership is overseen by the Executive Board. The Board brings together the three safeguarding partners to lead children's safeguarding and the promotion of child welfare in Kent.
- The partnership is supported by a small business team.

What does KSCMP do?

- Oversees multi-agency working, including liaising with all safeguarding partners.
- Training and training resources, including multi-agency, elearning, bespoke and factsheets.
- Practice development / thematic reviews looking at improving practice and sharing good practice.
- Rapid reviews / local practice reviews.
- Guidance on a range of matters including procedures, policies and signposting (various links on the website).
- Keep up to date with national guidance and complete work around new initiatives and studies.







Safeguarding Risks in Education settings including Early Years


- KSCMP has an Education group which was formed in April 2022. Quarterly
 meetings are held and a representative from The Education People represents
 Early Years Settings.
- KSCMP are trying to build up a picture of safeguarding risks from a range of partners and some of this work is being completed through the Education group.
- The purpose of today is to try and capture some of the Early Years safeguarding risks and KSCMP are interested in the risks to wellbeing that children are facing.
- KSCMP then wishes to share the information collected anonymously with the Education group when they next meet in April 2023 and add some themes to the risk register.



Safeguarding Risks in Education Settings including Early Years - Parameters

What are the risks to wellbeing that children are facing?

KSCMP need to know about safeguarding risks that are affecting children from a multi-agency point of view, as our aim is to be aware of risks that may feed in to our current work or help to be aware / keep track of possible emerging / escalating risks.

Safeguarding Files in education

Practice Review work

An ongoing Kent Local Child Safeguarding Practice Review has identified the quality of safeguarding files held in education settings and the transfer of those files when children have moved between settings, is an area that could be improved.

Ofsted -

- *staff who make timely and detailed recording of concerns and recognise and respond to patterns of concerning behaviour
- well-organised record keeping and reporting

Experts and Mentoring Programme

What is the Early Years Expert and Mentoring Programme?

In October 2021, the Department for Education (DfE) announced that £153 million will be invested to strengthen teaching in the early years and address the impact of the pandemic on the youngest children.

The Experts and Mentors Early Years COVID-19 Recovery Programme from the Department for Education is focused on supporting early years practitioners and leaders to address the impact of the pandemic on the youngest children.

The DfE's national lead for the Expert and Mentoring Programme is Penn Green.



The Programme

This programme offers early years support, delivered either face to face or virtually, by trained experts and mentors to:

- early years practitioners
- leaders
- whole settings.

The offer to early years settings includes:

- leadership support
- coaching for leaders
- mentoring for practitioners
- whole-setting support depending on a setting's priorities and needs.



Who Will Deliver the Support to Settings?

There are three different roles within the programme who will provide support to settings: Mentor, Expert and Area Lead.

Mentors, to provide online or remote support to early years practitioners as they complete a new online child development training package.

Experts, to provide face-to-face support to leaders of settings.

Area leads, to act as a first point of contact in their region for Experts and Mentors, and to provide face-to-face support to setting leaders.

All roles will focus on helping children recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, including narrowing the gap between disadvantaged children and others.

Which Settings are Eligible for This Programme?

The Experts and Mentors programme will support Private Voluntary or Independent (PVI) nursery settings, maintained nursery schools and school-based nurseries.

To be eligible for the programme, settings must fit at least one of the following criteria:

- been judged as requires improvement (RI) or inadequate by Ofsted in the last three years
- high numbers of children in receipt of EY Pupil Premium
- high numbers of children with SEND needs
- high numbers of children taking up the disadvantaged twoyear-old offer.

Please note, this programme will not support reception year. For example, a school with reception year only is not eligible to receive support through this programme.



How Much Time is Required for This Programme?

Settings selected for the Experts and Mentor programme will receive the support of an Expert and Mentor for *one term*, between April 2023 and July 2024.

Over the term, setting leaders will be provided with up to three days of support from their Expert. In addition, practitioners will receive up to six hours of support from their Mentor.

This time can be broken down into hours, as necessary, to suit the Expert, Mentor and staff at the setting receiving support.

What is the Early Years Childminder Mentor Programme?

In October 2021, the Department for Education (DfE) announced that £153 million will be invested to strengthen teaching in the early years and address the impact of the pandemic on the youngest children.

The Department for Education (DfE) is offering a programme of support for childminders across England, from May 2023 until July 2024. The Childminder Mentor Programme is focused on supporting childminders to address the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the youngest and most disadvantaged children.

The DfE's national lead is Hempsall's.



The Programme

This programme provides support and advice, for example, reviewing practice, identifying children most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and advising how they can be best supported.

Childminders will get up to four days of support *over one term*. The four days will be split into hours, to suit the mentor and the childminders they are supporting.

Support is free and will be mainly virtual. If suitable, there will be an option to meet face to face.



Who Will Deliver the Support to Childminders?

There are two different roles within the programme who will provide support to childminders: Mentor and Area Lead.

The key difference between the role of Area Lead and Mentor is that Area Leads will also be responsible for supporting the Mentors in their area.

Area Leads and Mentors all have at least three years' experience in the childminder sector. They are childminders themselves, or former childminders. They may also be staff who currently work in childminder roles.

Where Mentors are current childminders, they must have an Ofsted rating of 'good' or 'outstanding' (or CMA equivalent). Former childminders must also provide their most recent rating and fit these criteria.



Who Is Eligible to Receive Support from This Programme?

To be eligible to receive support from the DfE Childminder Mentor programme, childminders must currently be providing childcare to children aged between 0-5 (to at least one child).

You can apply for support as an individual, or with other childminders as part of a small group (of up to four people).

If you apply as an individual, you will be placed in a group with others.



Stronger Practice Hub Update

- The Stronger Practice Hub (SPH) Programme is part of the Department for Education (DfE) Early Years COVID-19 Recovery package.
- The two year programme is led by the DfE's delivery partner the National Children's Bureau (NCB), in partnership with the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF).

•







As a Stronger Practice Hub we will:

- provide targeted support in areas of the highest deprivation and where children have the lowest Good Levels of Development (GLD) and offer four evidence-based programmes in these identified areas
- universally focus on acting as a point of contact for bespoke advice and signposting to other funded support
- establish networks of settings to share knowledge and effective practice whilst at the same time upskilling the early years sector and building a network of providers that is resilient and stronger together.



- One of 18 hubs across the country (currently 13 with more to be recruited next year).
- Lead setting Discovery Day Nursery.
- Our partners include:
 - Northfleet Nursery School (Neersha Singh Headteacher)
 - Gem Maclachlan (childminder) based in Herne Bay
 - Oaks Day Nursery and Smarties Day Nursery (The Education People nurseries).
