Training and support for education settings 2023—2024



Overview

The **Prevent Duty** is about safeguarding individuals and communities from the threat of terrorism, it is one of the four stands of the Government's Counter Terrorism Strategy **CONTEST**.

All education settings and childcare providers have "have due regard to the need to **prevent** people from being drawn into terrorism". Prevent covers all forms of terrorism and extremism, including Right Wing Terrorism, violent Islamist extremism, and emerging risks such as mass shootings and the Involuntary Celibate movement. It's about everyone taking responsibility and knowing what to do if they have concerns.

Safeguarding

Protecting children and young people from the risk of radicalisation, is an integral part of **Keeping children safe in education**, it's important that all staff and governors know how to protect them from this threat. Prevent is no different to any other aspect of safeguarding such as protecting children and young people from harms such as drugs, gangs, neglect, and sexual exploitation. Understanding, how to embed the Prevent Duty as part of your wider approach to safeguarding and across the curriculum will help you to protect your students from the risks of radicalisation, violent extremism, becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism.

Training FAQ's

Our training offer is designed to build on the [Free Online \(Official\) Prevent Duty Training](#) from the Home Office to reflect the local and national risks and issues, as well as is tailored to the setting and audience.

As a minimum, we recommend that all staff and governors should undertake a Workshop to Raise Awareness of Prevent training at least every two years. However, training should reflect emerging local or national risks, it may need to be updated more frequently to reflect changing circumstances and local issues. Settings should also take account of staff turnover so that new staff, supply staff and trainee teachers fully understand their responsibilities under the Prevent duty.

We advise that further training on the Prevent Duty and associated risks and issues is made available to the settings Strategic Prevent Lead, Designated Safeguarding Leads and other relevant staff where appropriate.

- All Kent and Medway training is **free of charge**
- Training delivery can be in person, online or hybrid, minimum numbers apply for in person delivery.
- Prevent safeguarding awareness and the local context is the starting point for the wider staff training offer and a prerequisite prior to booking and delivery of any of our other training or workshops.
- Specialist workshops for children and young people and parents/carers are prioritised based on a number of criteria including, local (district) incidents and risk profile, setting Prevent referrals or on-going concerns and delivery capacity.

Training and Workshop Offer (staff)

Prevent safeguarding awareness and the local context (1.5 hours)

A session for all staff and governors that is designed to:

- Build understanding of the Prevent Strategy and your role within it.
- Develop your existing expertise and professional judgement to recognise individuals who may be vulnerable or susceptible to radicalisation.
- Provide a clear picture of the risks and threats both nationally, in Kent and Medway, and as well as your local area.
- Highlight emerging issues that could increase vulnerability for your pupils and school community.

Advanced Prevent, case studies, referrals and Channel Panel (2 hours)

A workshop to ensure that senior leaders, governors, DSL's and Prevent leads have:

- A clear understanding of how to develop a whole-school approach to the Prevent duty to safeguard pupils and meet Ofsted requirements.
- How to evaluate concerns relating to radicalisation and how, when, and who to share information with and make a Prevent referral.
- How the Channel panel in Kent and Medway works and FAQ for attendees.
- Case studies to build on existing safeguarding processes and develop an understanding of modern extremist narratives, risk and issues.

Training and support for education settings 2023 - 2024

Extremist use of online gaming and radicalisation (75 minutes)

A session for staff/settings that have previously undertaken **Prevent**, safeguarding awareness and the local context training. The session is designed to

- Increase your knowledge of children and young peoples online gaming and viewing habits.
- Develop an understanding of online gaming spaces, gaming terminology and online culture.
- Understand how extremist uses video games, gaming platforms and technology to lure and radicalise young people.
- Learn about how extremists have gamified violence and terrorism.

Extremism, Gender stereotyping, Influencers, Incels, Misogyny, and the Manosphere (75 minutes)

A session for staff/settings that have previously undertaken **Prevent**, safeguarding awareness and the local context training. The session is designed to

- Think about the impact of gender stereotyping and misogyny.
- Understanding the online and offline issues and risk.
- Consider who may be susceptible to suspectable to violent misogynist and Incel narratives.

Training and Workshop Offer (parents/carers)

Understanding Radicalisation in Children and Young People (1 Hour)

A session for parents/carers and governors that requires no prior knowledge which focuses on:

- What is radicalisation and how it may present in children and young people.
- How to minimise harmful behaviour, content, and contact online (understanding the risks and issues).
- Common issues in gaming and social media platforms. Understand how video games, and gaming platforms can be used to exploit children by extremists and spread hate.
- Sharing practical strategies and ideas that can build resilience in children and young people to protect them from exploitation online.
- What to do and where to get help if things go wrong.
- Signposting free good quality resources and websites.

Training and Workshop Offer (children and young people)

Young Zak the Gamer (60 minutes)

A workshop for children and young people in years 5 to 8 which is designed to:

- Increase young people's awareness of exploitation for radicalisation
- Reinforce messages of good online safety
- Develop critical thinking in young people, equipping them with tools to keep themselves safe
- Generate discussion around Radicalisation, Grooming and, British Values Build an understanding of how to raise concerns and seek help

Other workshops and assemblies for children and young people

We also deliver specially designed workshops and assemblies to children and young people from key stage 1 up. Availability of these sessions is limited and prioritised based on the criteria listed in FAQ (see page 2). Please contact us for more information.
