Introduction

The purpose of this document is to encourage a consistent and proportionate approach to raising awareness of the PREVENT agenda as part of the wider safeguarding agenda and to comply with the Kent County Council(KCC) and Medway Council's obligation under the Counter Terrorism and Security Act 2015 guidance. This training plan can be used to support training across all Kent and Medway parts in fulfilling their Prevent duty. The Counter Terrorism and Security Act 2015 (CTSA 2015) states local authorities have *"due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism"*.

PREVENT is an element of the Governments counter terrorism strategy known as CONTEST. The aim of Prevent is to stop people from becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism.

The objectives of Prevent are:

- tackling the ideological causes of terrorism
- intervening early to support people susceptible to radicalisation
- enabling people who have already engaged in terrorism to disengage and rehabilitate.

Purpose

The purpose of this document is to provide a structured long-term response as to how the PREVENT eLearning, Prevent and Channel Manager, Prevent Community Engagement Officer and Prevent Education Officers' training will be provided throughout Kent and Medway, as part of a rolling program of training and awareness raising.

Responsibilities

To ensure the Kent and Medway Prevent Team by way of Kent County Council (KCC) and Medway Unitary Authority (UA) achieves their statutory obligation with reference to the Prevent Duty under the Counter Terrorism Security Act 2015 (CTSA 2015) and pay due regard to preventing people being drawn into terrorism.

Organisational Prevent Leads / Heads of Service/Senior Managers

Organisational Prevent Leads, Heads of Service and senior management have responsibility for their service in respect to this duty and its compliance.

Senior managers have a duty to make themselves familiar with the requirements of their respective sections in relation to PREVENT to ensure the Local Authority, compliance with the CTSA 2015.

Levels of Training

The level of training required will depend on the nature of the employee's role, level of responsibility and opportunity for interaction with individuals who may be vulnerable and/or susceptible to radicalisation.

All Staff Basic Training

All statutory prevent partners to complete their internal Prevent E-learning module which is saved to their training record held on a central register.

This gives all staff a sufficient level of knowledge which meets compliance with the Prevent duty.

Levels 1-4

The purpose of these levels of training is to ensure that all staff are suitably equipped to be able to recognise the basic behavioural patterns relating to radicalisation. The priorities in the Counter Terrorism Local Profile (CTLTP) and Counter Terrorism Situational Risk Assessment (CTSRA) form the focus in this training. This also includes all local context that is relevant to Kent and Medway.

Elected Members / Councillors

Elected Members / Councillors play a significant role in our communities through both engagement and representation; therefore suitable training is essential, so they have a clear understanding of the safeguarding ethos of Prevent and Channel. The following is recommended as training every 2 years for Elected Members / Councillors:

- Home Office Prevent E-Learning
- Kent and Medway Prevent Team Training for local context
- Knowledge on how to submit a Prevent Referral
- Demonstrate knowledge on the Channel structure and procedure

The decision as to which category an employee falls into is dependent upon the level of access the role has to young people or adults and this will further be determined by the level of regional risk.

Briefings

The briefings delivered by the Kent and Medway Prevent Team are designed to give an overview and update on progress or developments regarding the delivery of Prevent in Kent and Medway. These are delivered as and when requested by primarily senior management, Elected Members/ Councillors, partnership groups and external partners, statutory and non-statutory. They can be delivered in person or online.

In addition to other Prevent related duties, the Prevent and Channel Manager is also responsible for overseeing the administration of the training within Kent and Medway. This entails:

1. Provision of bespoke training to high-risk groups, Channel chairs and specialist officers and all partners.
2. Provision of sessions for single points of contact for internal local authority departments, external commissioned services and partners.
3. Provision of sessions to Designated Safeguarding Leads for schools/Primary and secondary schools– delivered by the Prevent Education Officers (See PEO Offer on Pages 11-13) and all community training delivered additionally by the Prevent Community Engagement Officer.
4. Assisting and managing commissioned services compliance with pre commissioned contract with the Local Authority to satisfy Prevent duty responsibilities including the provision of training.
5. Providing formal responses in partnership with the Local Authority Organisation Development Team for figures relating to staff training levels.

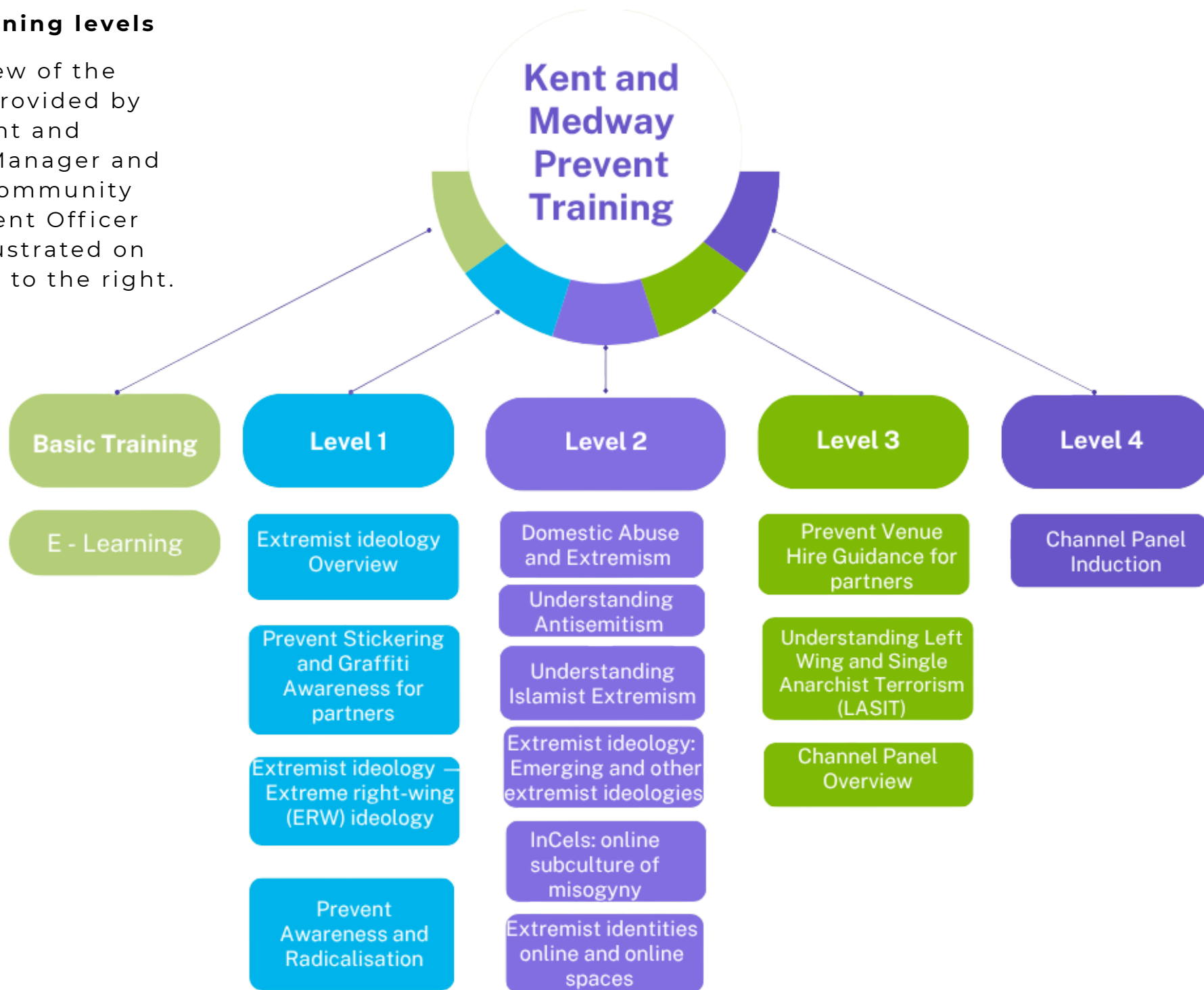
Statutory / Non Statutory Partners

This training strategy applies to all statutory partners but can be utilised by all partners as the Kent and Medway Prevent team are available for all across Kent and Medway. All sessions are available via [Kent Children's Safeguarding Multi-agency Partnership \(KSCMP\)](#).

Tiered training levels

An overview of the training provided by the Prevent and Channel Manager and Prevent Community Engagement Officer can be illustrated on the image to the right.



Tiered Training Levels - Explained

Basic Training

This refers to any E-learning or mandatory training. For Statutory Partners, this will be mandated through own organisations, e.g. Police, Local Authority, Education, Health, Prisons , Probation and may be provided by organisations' own E Learning systems. This may also reference the Home Office E Learning package.

All are expected to complete Prevent E-Learning before moving into Level 1.

Level 1

This should be completed by key frontline staff within all of the organisations listed above.

Level 2

This should be completed by all staff from Level 1 as well as managers/ senior managers.

Level 3

This should be completed by staff with specialist responsibilities, such as Safeguarding Leads, organisational Prevent Leads, Safeguarding Champions etc.

Level 4

This should be completed by staff who are expected to attend Channel Panel as part of their role.

Prevent Awareness and the Local Context

A session for all staff and governors that is designed to:

- Build understanding of the statutory Prevent Duty and your role within it.
- Develop your existing expertise and professional judgement to recognise individuals who may be susceptible to radicalisation.
- Provide a clear picture of the risks and threats nationally, regionally in Kent and Medway, and locally within your district.
- Offer suggestions for how to implement Prevent within a whole school approach and build students' resilience to extreme narratives.
- Ensure that staff understand the potential risks of the online space as a radicalising influence on children and young people.

Extremist Use of the Internet

A session for all staff/ settings that have previously undertaken 'Prevent Awareness and the Local Context' session, that is designed to:

- Understand how extremists use social media, gaming platforms and technology to lure and radicalise young people.
- Develop knowledge around the types of extremist content that can be found on mainstream platforms.
- Support education professionals to safeguard young people against extremism in the online space and how this can feed into the online safety curriculum.

Staff Training Sessions



Extreme Misogyny, Stereotyping, Influencers and the Manosphere

A session for all staff/ settings that have previously undertaken 'Prevent Awareness and the Local Context' session, that is designed to:

- Think about the impact of gender stereotyping and misogyny within our society, and how this shapes the issues around extreme and violent misogyny.
- Exploring violent misogyny, the Manosphere and the Incel movement.
- An optional 30 minute task-based session can be added to explore a script approach to tackling misogynistic language used by pupils in education settings.

Parent/Carer Prevent and Online Safety

A session for parents and carers that is designed to:

- Build an understanding of what radicalisation is and an overview of Prevent.
- Inform parents and carers about the risks of radicalisation in the online space.
- Provide practical safeguarding advice and guidance to protect young people from radicalisation online, as well as supporting them to develop critical thinking skills and resilience to extreme narratives.

COUNTERING EXTREMISM IN YOUNG PEOPLE

Who is susceptible?

Any child could be susceptible to extremist narratives.

There are some factors that may make some children more susceptible than others.

Extremist groups tap into young people's insecurities and claim to offer answers and promise a sense of identity that young people often seek.

As part of their recruitment strategy, extremist groups also work to undermine the authority of parents and guardians.



Definitions and key terms

01 Extremism

The vocal or active demonstration of extreme views, including defending the use of law, violence, or other means to achieve a political, religious or ideological cause.

02 Terrorism

An action or threat designed to influence the government or intimidate the public, the purpose is to advance a political, religious or ideological cause.

03 Radicalisation

The term commonly used to describe the process by which a person adopts extremist views or practices to the point of legitimising the use of violence.

Prevent & Channel

Prevent

Prevent is part of the UK's counter-terrorism strategy, CONTEST. Its main goal is to protect vulnerable people from becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism. Prevent has three key objectives:

1. Address the root causes of radicalisation and counter terrorist ideologies.
2. Safeguard and support those at risk of radicalisation through early intervention.
3. Help those involved in terrorism to disengage and rehabilitate.



Channel

Channel is a voluntary, confidential programme that helps people at risk of being drawn into terrorism. It involves multiple agencies: the local authorities, police, education, and health providers. Channel is a support programme, not a criminal sanction. Referrals can come from anyone concerned about someone at risk, including family, friends, and colleagues. Channel offers various types of support, such as:

1. Education and career advice
2. Mental or emotional health support
3. Help with drug or alcohol abuse
4. Theological or ideological mentoring

what can you do?

Talking to your child about extremism and telling them the facts will help them to challenge extremist arguments.

Be honest with them and talk to them about extremism and radicalisation on a regular basis.

Teach your children to understand that just because someone is different, it doesn't mean they are dangerous.

Extremists Use of the Internet

The internet and online platforms are utilised in various ways by extremists who aim to normalise their ideologies. They establish support by aligning with personal interests, making operational instructions easily accessible. Their messages have an extended reach, and supporter networks often become self-sustaining.

Taking Advantage of Vulnerabilities

Extremists exploit vulnerabilities such as social isolation, anxiety, low self-esteem, and troubled home lives that many children and young people face. They target vulnerable individuals by offering opportunities to join a network of like-minded people, providing a sense of belonging, friendship, and acceptance that these individuals may lack in their daily lives.

Those targeted for radicalisation may be offered:

- Friendship and someone who listens and understands them
- A feeling of being accepted where they are isolated in their offline life
- Gifts, money and online gaming tokens or access to online gaming tournaments
- The opportunity to discuss current affairs, grievances and injustices
- Membership of closed groups through messaging apps

Warning Signs that someone is being radicalised online

- Isolation and withdrawal from family and friends
- Particular interest in certain divisive news topics, ideologies or conspiracy theories
- Increased secrecy about online activities
- Internet searches that indicate an interest in an ideology, violence (e.g. gore videos), and/or chemicals and explosives
- Spending excessive amounts of time online
- Joining closed groups on messaging apps following conversations with "friends" online
- New online friends that appear to be influential
- Negative views about certain groups within the community, possibly including violent sentiments towards them

CHANNEL

CHANNEL IS A KEY PART OF THE PREVENT STRATEGY AND IS REQUIRED BY LAW UNDER THE COUNTER TERRORISM AND SECURITY ACT 2015. IT'S A PROGRAMME IN ENGLAND AND WALES THAT HELPS PEOPLE WHO MIGHT BE AT RISK OF BECOMING INVOLVED IN TERRORISM.

Before any support can be provided under the Channel programme, the individual referred (or their parent or legal guardian, if they are under 18) must give their consent. This ensures that participation is voluntary and respects the individual's autonomy.

Early Intervention and Support

Channel offers early support to anyone vulnerable to being drawn into terrorism or supporting terrorist organisations, regardless of age, faith, ethnicity, or background. This support helps individuals before their vulnerabilities are exploited by those promoting terrorism and before they become involved in terrorist activities.

How are individuals identified for Channel support?

Individuals are identified for Channel support through a multi-agency approach that involves various professionals and community members. Here's how the process typically works:

Referral

Initial Assessment

Channel Panel Review

Consent

Support Plan

Monitoring and Review

Statistics

- 6,817 referrals to Prevent were made in the year ending March 2023.
- Since 2015, over 4,400 referrals have been supported through the Channel Programme.
- Individuals aged 15 to 20 accounted for the largest proportion (32%) referrals
- Individuals aged 14 and under accounted for 31%, followed by individuals aged between 21 and 30 (14%).

What is Prevent?

Prevent is a crucial element of the UK's strategy to combat terrorism. It aims to stop individuals from becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism

Offering support to those at risk of radicalisation.

Shielding communities from radicalising influences.

Targets all forms of terrorism without discrimination

Involves teachers, healthcare workers, social services, police, and community leaders.

Equips frontline staff to identify and address signs of radicalisation.

There are different types of terrorism and Prevent deals with all of them.

Prevent is run locally by experts who understand the risks and issues in their area, and how best to support their communities. These experts include local authorities, the police, charities, and community organisations



Kent County Council and Medway Unitary Authority have the lead role in delivering the Prevent Strategy across Kent and Medway in accordance with the **Prevent Duty Guidance** and work with partners such as the Police, Education and Health.

Prevent is a statutory duty for Kent County Council and Medway Unitary Authority. This duty complements existing safeguarding responsibilities, ensuring individuals at risk of radicalisation receive support similar to those at risk of other harms, such as substance abuse or exploitation.

Objectives

- Tackle the ideological causes of terrorism
- Intervene early to support people susceptible to radicalisation
- enable people who have already engaged in terrorism to disengage and rehabilitate



The Online Risk of Radicalisation

Taking Advantage of Vulnerabilities

Extremists exploit vulnerabilities such as social isolation, anxiety, low self-esteem, and troubled home lives that many children and young people face. They target vulnerable individuals by offering opportunities to join a network of like-minded people, providing a sense of belonging, friendship, and acceptance that these individuals may lack in their daily lives.

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Disinformation & Misinformation

A common approach used by extremists is to spread misinformation and fake news to generate anger and outrage, often shrewdly curating and exploiting national or local issues to play on our emotions, deeply held beliefs and values.

Often, posts from extremist organisations use patriotism, support for popular causes, fear-mongering, grievances and idealistic or shocking imagery in formats such as social media memes, videos, audio clips and images which act as a gateway into more overtly hateful and divisive content distributed through closed groups and private online conversations.

HOW TO TALK TO CHILDREN ABOUT RADICALISM

IMPORTANCE OF TALKING TO CHILDREN

Having a conversation about radicalism is a key part of keeping your child safe. It helps them understand what radicalism is and how it can be dangerous. It also helps them to challenge extremist arguments and to seek support if they are worried.

CREATE A SAFE SPACE

Children need to feel safe to talk to you about their concerns. Let them know that you are there to listen and that you will not get angry with them for talking to you. Reassure them that you will help them if they are worried.

REAPPROACHABLE

Children need to feel that talking to you about radicalism is a normal part of life. Use simple language and avoid jargon. Be honest and open about your own views and feelings.

DISCUSS ONLINE SAFETY

Children need to understand the risks of online radicalism. Talk to them about the dangers of sharing personal information online and the importance of not believing everything they see on the internet.

USE AGE APPROPRIATE LANGUAGE

Use language that is appropriate to your child's age and understanding. Avoid using complex terms or jargon. Be clear and direct in your communication.

MEASURED SUPPORT

Children need to feel that you are there to support them. Offer them the reassurance and support they need to feel safe and secure. Be patient and listen to their concerns.

HIGHLIGHT POSITIVE VALUES

Children need to understand the importance of positive values. Highlight the values of respect, tolerance, and kindness. Encourage them to stand up for what is right.

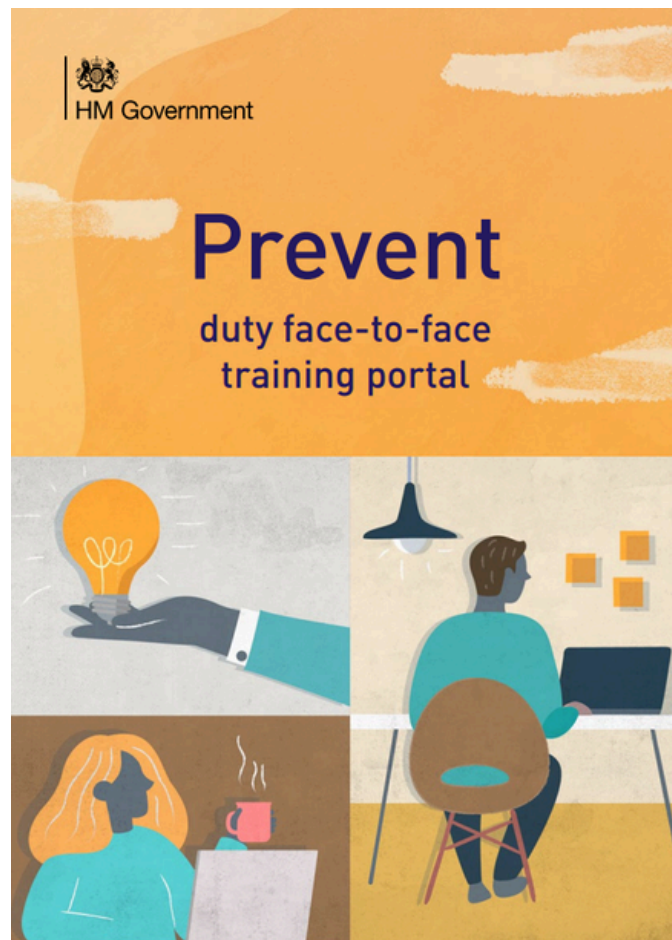
