Waterloo 200 launches a unique national schools' competition:

TIMELINE 200





<u>Waterloo 200</u>, in partnership with <u>Hungry for History</u>, is seeking to challenge schoolchildren from across the UK to determine their 100 defining moments in history of the last 200 years from 1815-2015.

CATEGORIES: HISTORY, NATURE, ART, SPORT AND SCIENCE/TECHNOLOGY

AGE GROUPS: 7-10, 11-13, 14-16, 17-18

TIMINGS: COMPETITION OPENS FRI 20TH MARCH 2015 / COMPETITION CLOSES WED 8TH JULY 2015

This is a special opportunity for the younger generation to express their ideas nationally and to leave their own legacy for future generations during these commemorations. TIMELINE 200 is looking to appeal to teachers and pupils across the curriculum. Individuals, teams or schools can enter as many 'moments' as they wish. The winning 'moments' will be announced during the Michaelmas Term in 2015 and entered into a national Hall of Fame. Each 'moment' will also be produced as a certificate, signed by the judges and presented to each winning school.

A distinguished and famed judging panel will decide on the winning '100 Defining Moments' with 20 'defining moments' chosen from all of the five categories with equal representation from each age group.

Dan Snow, Historian, Writer and Presenter and a Timeline 200 judge said, "I'd like to see our history through the eyes of a child and to hear their views on our defining moments. Children tend to have no preconceived ideas. They are very perceptive and can make some amazing observations without sugar coating because they have no reason to."

Mike Diaper OBE, Executive Director, Community Sport, Sport England said, "This competition makes it possible to show how the study of sport can highlight past and present role models and encourage the younger generation of today to find a sporting hero the love and want to aspire to."

The judging panel also includes Sir Anthony Seldon, Master of Wellington College, contemporary historian, commentator and political author; Dr Sabine Clark, President of the British Science Association's History of Science Section; Professor Ian Swingland OBE PhD DSc, Founder of The Durrell Institute for Conservation and Ecology; Alex Hirtzel, multi-disciplined artist & art historian and Christina Nash of Radiator Arts.

The founder of Hungry for History is Wellesley House School in Broadstairs, which is the town that sees the start of the New Waterloo Dispatch ceremonial interpretation in June 2015.

Waterloo 200

Waterloo 200 is an umbrella organisation approved and supported by Government to oversee the commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Waterloo. Granted charitable status in 2009 it is planning and co-coordinating the main events and pursuing an educational programme that is also seeking to create a living legacy.

The New Waterloo Dispatch is a ceremonial interpretation of the news of Waterloo reaching various European cities. It comprises a new Dispatch for 2015, to be presented to senior members of the Royal Family, European VIPs and other public dignitaries during many ceremonies involving a horse-drawn post chaise along the routes used by the official messengers to deliver the historic dispatches from the Waterloo battlefield to Brussels, London and Berlin. Significant occasions are being organised in Belgium, Germany and UK including services at St Paul's and Canterbury Cathedrals. Other events, in London and Kent, to commemorate this historic occasion, are currently being planned and will be announced shortly.

- Why Defining Moments: Because The Battle of Waterloo was a Defining Moment itself in European History.
- A milestone in itself, this national competition challenges children to present their 'defining moments' through visualization, context, cause and effect.
- This is a unique opportunity for children, for the first time, to get their ideas out nationally and to leave their own legacy for future generations during these commemorations.

- We want to appeal to pupils and teachers across the curriculum and not just limit it to history. There are brilliant teachers across all sectors looking for new ideas/resources to ignite that spark. That is whom we will be looking to encourage.
- Individuals, teams or schools can enter. We are not setting any limitations in order to encourage as much participation as possible.
- Judges are preferably being chosen on provenance rather than a celebrity basis. They are also being chosen because they have experience of working with the younger generation.
- Schools can choose as many 'defining moments' as they wish but each submitted entry must be backed up with their research and explanations.
- The competition encourages children to look at their local history and not just the recognised milestones in history that have shaped our world today.
- A distinguished judging panel will decide on the winning '100 Defining Moments' with 20 'defining moments' chosen from each of the five categories with equal representation from each age group.

COMPETITION TIMINGS

- Dan Snow and Peter Snow highlighted the competition at the audiences with London and Kent Schools in March 2015
- Timeline 200 is launched on Friday 20th March 2015 at the start of the Hundred Days of Napoleon and at the end of the Lent Term. The competition will close on 8th July 2015.
- The launch will therefore lead into and raise schools' awareness of the bicentenary commemorations.
- Judges' review: August/September 2015
- The winning 'Defining Moments" will be announced and published in early October 2015 as an
 educational legacy that has arisen from the educational platform that is the New Waterloo
 Dispatch.
- All '100 Defining Moments' will be shown in a Hall of Fame on Waterloo 200's new educational website and other supporting websites.
- Each winning 'Defining Moment' would be also be produced as a certificate and signed by the judges to be given to each winning school.

Dr Sabine Clarke is a historian of science who works at the University of York and has previously taught at the University of Oxford and Imperial College. Her historical research looks at the place of science in the British Empire. She explores the role that British scientists played in making maps, collecting plants and animals and doing experiments in tropical environments. Dr Clarke is also interested in public engagement with the history of science and she is currently President of the "History of Science Section" of the British Science Association.

During this time he also helped forge international school links between schools in Manchester and Omsk in Siberia where he still volunteers. Even when I was young, animals were better company than humans, and fascinated me more. I loved watching them and trying to figure out why they do what they do. But it was Mary Geddie at Haberdashers' Aske's Preparatory School that engaged and inspired my lifelong passion for the natural world and cemented the direction of my life. A good teacher can make their work relevant to the world today and tomorrow, and can change so many lives. What happened in the past, what people did to the land, the environment and wildlife, gives us insights into what we should do, and not do, in the future. But even conservation professionals ignore or deliberately overlook environmental history, politicians included. We need to inspire knowledge and understanding of what happened in the past, and embed it in the future.

About Professor Swingland

Prof. Swingland has been a major figure in biology conservation and biodiversity for over twenty years. His influence on the direction and progress of the science has been immense. Throughout his career, he has been responsible for policy, planning and implementation, and particularly in the last three decades for establishing and developing world-class initiatives and organizations. He is an inspiring communicator and innovative thinker who has the rare ability to turn a vision into reality.

Since the last 40 years, Prof. Swingland has worked as a consultant with bilateral & multilateral agencies and companies in conservation and biodiversity management, and as advisor or member of governmental and non-governmental organisations in a number of countries. He is Founder of The Durrell Institute for Conservation and Ecology ("DICE") and is a former Visiting Professor at the Universities of Michigan, Florence, Auckland, and Manchester Metropolitan. He was educated at London, Edinburgh and Oxford Universities. As the first Chair in Conservation Biology in the U.K. (now Emeritus), he was a draftsman of the Convention on Biodiversity. He has worked as a mathematician for Shell and as a biologist with the Royal Society.

DICE is now a world leader in the field of conservation biology teaching new generations of conservation scientists from around the world. As Director of DICE, he supervised work in 42

countries and trained over 400 conservation biologists from 48 countries in biodiversity management, sustainable development, and the commercialisation of biodiversity assets. He is the founder of The Herpetological Conservation Trust, an international non-governmental organisation with substantial assets; and of "Biodiversity and Conservation", the world's first multidisciplinary journal in biodiversity management and sustainable development. He is a Trustee of Earthwatch and many other trusts with interests in global conservation and development. The Secretary of State DEFRA appointed him to the Darwin Initiative, which funds multisectoral projects in biodiversity management, and the Chairmanship of a Research Council. He was appointed by the Secretary General of the Commonwealth and the President of Guyana to be Chairman of the International Board of Trustees, Iwokrama International Centre for Rain Forest Conservation and Development, the largest biodiversity project belonging to the Commonwealth.

A leading authority on commercialising biodiversity assets and the conservation of protected areas, Professor Swingland is an advisor on conservation and bio-diversity management to the World Bank, the Global Environment Facility, the Asian Development Bank, and the U.K. Government, and has obtained funding for projects in Bangladesh, Swaziland, Peru and Indonesia as well 23 other countries, including the largest single biodiversity project in the world; the Sundarban Biodiversity Conservation project in Bangladesh. He co-wrote the Country Programming Framework for China which will reduce land degradation, get 25m people a year out of agriculture, create alternative livelihoods, and conserve biodiversity using a market, not donation, approach. He also advises major corporations on environmental policy. He played a significant role in creating the national Access course which is designed for people who would like to study in higher education but who left school without the usual qualifications.
