Introduction

There have been a number of significant developments in the safeguarding agenda for schools and settings, both locally and nationally in recent months. As a consequence this Newsletter contains a great deal of information that needs to be cascaded to all staff and school governors at in the Autumn Term.

Education Safeguarding Team

As you will probably be aware by now, the EST has recently undergone several changes. Kel Arthur (Principal Officer) and Helen Windiate, Area Safeguarding Adviser (North Kent) both took early retirement at the end of the summer term after several years as members of the team. Claire Ray, who some of you will know as the Area Safeguarding Adviser (West Kent), has been appointed to the post of Principal Officer. Our best wishes go to Kel and Helen in their retirement, although their experience is not lost totally as both are willing to support the team doing specific pieces of work on a sessional basis during the period of transition.

We can also confirm that Lorrisa Webber joined us from the London Borough of Bromley on 19 September 2016 and has taken up the post as Area Safeguarding Adviser (North Kent). A revised contact sheet is attached to this Newsletter and the level of support, advice and training provided to schools and settings will be unaffected by these changes.

National and Local Policy Updates

Keeping Children Safe in Education 2016

On May 26th 2016 the DfE published a revised edition of the statutory guidance for schools and colleges, Keeping Children Safe in Education 2016 (KCSIE). The NSPCC has complied a comprehensive briefing which highlights the changes in the revised document (link below). Ofsted Inspection Framework

On the 23rd August Ofsted updated their 'Inspecting safeguarding in early years, education and skills' handbook. The handbook sets out what inspectors must consider and outlines the evidence that will be looked for during inspections. It also sets out the judgements that inspectors will make and on which they will report. Ofsted have published a document summarising the main changes.

The inspection framework follows the main principles of the updated KCSIE 2016, with which Early Years settings may not be familiar. It is recommended, therefore, that DSLs in these settings follow the links above to familiarise themselves with the expectations placed on DSLs within schools and colleges to ensure they are able to fully meet the requirements expected by Ofsted.

Please be aware that changes will be made to these documents to reflect the most current local and national guidance so DSLs are encouraged to check KELSI regularly for updates to ensure that their policy is relevant and appropriate. Please be aware that some content will still be undergoing review during September and October.

Dealing with complaints or issues on social networking sites

In January 2016 the Department for Education issued non-statutory guidance, "Best Practice Advice for School Complaints Procedures 2016". KCC has revised its model procedure for handling school complaints to aid governing bodies in revising their own school's procedure.

Consultations and Referrals

Consultations

Working with children and their families can be complex and challenging. There will be times when professionals working in this area, however experienced they are, are unclear as to what action they should take. This will require them to seek advice and support from other experienced practitioners across the child care network. The information below describes structures and processes that are in place to ensure that this advice, support and consultation can happen within and between agencies across Kent.

Consultation within your own agency

All statutory agencies should offer means by which staff can seek help and advice on individual cases and are required to have a designated safeguarding lead (DSL). KCSIE 2016 states that the DSL and or a deputy should always be available during term time school or college hours, for staff to discuss any safeguarding concerns. Similar availability is expected in early years settings under the Ofsted inspection framework. All staff should be familiar with the DSLs contact details, including who should be contacted in their absence.

The Area Safeguarding Advisers within the EST provide the education lead professional function, being available to DSLs and other staff as required should they be unsure as to what action to take where there are concerns about a child or children.

Professional consultation with Specialist Children's Services

There are two types of professional consultation, the first, where you ring to discuss and share information on an identified child and the second where you may want to talk through a situation about a child but without sharing the child's details. The first requires you to inform the family, the second does not.

If you are unsure whether you need to inform the family prior to having a consultation, please seek advice from your Area Safeguarding Adviser who will be able to help you in making this decision. If you are confident a child will be placed at risk of harm if you do speak with the family, then a referral should be made to Specialist Children's Services, through the usual route.

Escalation

Any professional who believes that the response they have received following a consultation is inadequate, does not meet the needs of the child/family or leaves a child at risk of harm may still make a referral in the usual way or escalate the concerns through their Area Safeguarding Adviser.

Referrals

KCSIE 2016 specifically directs schools to follow up concerns and referrals actively, ensuring they are clear on the action to be taken by Specialist Children's Services. A decision should be made within one working day of a referral being made about what course of action will be taken and the referrer should be told of this outcome. KSCIE 2016 states *"should that information not be forthcoming"* then the school or college should be proactive in gathering this information.

The flowchart on page 10 of KCSIE 2016 clarifies that one of four outcomes will be communicated to the referrer within 24 hours

- Immediate safeguarding response removal of a child to a safe place
- Child protection investigation under Section 47 Children Act 1989
- Child in Need assessment under Section 17 Children Act 1989
- No further action by SCS but possible referral on to Early Help.

The Education Safeguarding Team has informed colleagues within Specialist Children's Services of the expectations placed on education providers in the revised guidance. However, if DSLs have difficulty in gaining this information, they should contact their Area Safeguarding Adviser.

Child Sexual Exploitation

Two reports have been published following a case review of CSE in the County. Both documents, the overview report and a shorter briefing, can be found on the KSCB website <u>Multi-Agency</u> <u>Review of the Services provided to Victims of Child Sexual Exploitation in Kent</u>

The review is based on events in 2013 and does recognise that some improvements have already been made. Criticisms were levelled at all agencies at their inability, at the time, to understand that the behaviours exhibited by the young people concerned were indicative of Child Sexual Exploitation.

It found that there was inadequate awareness amongst professionals of CSE across all agencies. Despite the young people involved exhibiting several of the risk factors in the medium and high risk categories as indicated by the Kent CSE Toolkit, sufficient action was not always taken to safeguard them. In particular, one school did not recognise their pupil was a victim of CSE, managing the presenting issues internally rather than sharing relevant information with other agencies. Whilst it is recognised the school was acting with the best of intentions, as they did not have a full picture of concerns from partner agencies, the support for the pupil was not effectively joined up.

All schools and settings should have access to the KSCB CSE toolkit and the CSE Intelligence form available at <u>www.kscb.org.uk/guidance/sexual-abuse-and-exploitation</u>. Secondary Schools and colleges in particular should ensure they have paper copies available with which all staff should familiarise themselves.

All staff in education settings should be familiar with 'Operation Willow', Kent's multiagency Child Sexual Exploitation Team (CSET) and its strapline, "say something if you see something". They should recognise concerns may be about siblings, staff and parents as well as their own pupils. Similarly, they may have local knowledge of interest which should be passed onto the police as intelligence using the CSET form.

"Lottie" CSE Training and Resources

Operation Willow has negotiated a reduced price for Kent and Medway Schools to attend "Lottie" training, facilitated by the University of Kent's Centre for Child Protection. The course usually costs £199 per delegate, but can be accessed for £60 for the next academic year.

NSPCC "Speak out. Stay safe" programme

The NSPCC's **Speak out. Stay safe** programme was launched in 2011, originally working with Y5/6 pupils, after research showed the majority of children who contact ChildLine are over 11 years of age but said their abuse started when they were much younger. In April 2016 the service was re-launched to include KS1 and all KS2 pupils

The programme, which aims to reach children before abuse starts, is delivered by trained NSPCC volunteers through an assembly and a workshop. Safeguarding messages are relayed in a lively

and interactive way. By the end of the visit, it is hoped children have had fun, feel empowered and can **speak out and stay safe**. All sessions are very carefully tailored to suit the age of the children. There is a 20 minute assembly for KS1, a 30 minute assembly for KS2 and then 60 minute classroom workshops for Y5/6. 11,500 children in almost 70 schools have been part of the programme in Kent and Medway over the past year.

Sarah Walker, Area Coordinator for the programme in Kent and Medway says: "We know that at least two children in every primary school classroom will have experienced some form of abuse or neglect – a truly shocking statistic. But just imagine if we could give these children the knowledge to prevent, the confidence to speak out and the courage to seek help if they need it. By visiting every school every two years, we could prevent children from experiencing abuse, one generation at a time."

Supporting parents to choose a sports club

It is the right of any parent or carer to check how well a sports club is run, for the sake of their child's safety and their own peace of mind. If you want to support parents to choose a good club for their child, here is some guidance you can give, and questions they could ask:

- Are staff and volunteers appropriately qualified and suitable to work with children?
- Does the organisation have a **child protection policy**?
- If you or your child has any worries, who can you talk to?
- Does the organisation have a written code of behaviour/conduct?
- What about arrangements for away fixtures and other events?
- What **training** has been provided for staff and volunteers?
- Does the club have a clear health and safety policy?
- Would they be able to **contact me** in an emergency?

A well-run club will welcome questions about their activities and policies. They will know they have a responsibility to give this kind of information to anyone who leaves a child in their care.

Sport England's Clubmark is a cross-sport accreditation scheme for community sports clubs. An accredited club is recognised as a safe, rewarding and fulfilling place for participants of all ages, as well as helping parents and carers know that they're choosing the right club for their young people.

If you are asked to host, work with, or promote a local club, or want to signpost parents to local clubs, Clubmark can be the first port of call for identifying their suitability.

If a club does not have Clubmark, the questions listed can still be used provide assurances.

Online Safety

Keeping Children Safe in Education 2016

The revised KCSIE 2016 has placed an increased focus on online safety. Key issues to be aware of include:

- Online safety is viewed as a safeguarding issue and therefore is part of the overall responsibility of the DSL. All staff involved in supporting the DSL with online safety, for example if there is a separate e-Safety lead, should access training to the same level as the DSL.
- All members of staff **must** be provided with appropriate online safety training
- School policies must recognise a range of **online safety issues**, including child on child abuse (such as cyberbullying and sexting) and should implement policies regarding acceptable use of technologies and social media
- School leaders should ensure there is **appropriate filtering and monitoring** in place.
- Governing bodies and proprietors should ensure children are taught about safeguarding, including online as part of providing a **broad and balanced curriculum**.

Online Safety Training

The Education Safeguarding Team can provide a range of centralised events for schools and settings regarding online safety. These include:

- "Online Safety (e-Safety) for Designated Safeguarding Leads": This is aimed at DSLs and will explore management responsibilities regarding online safety policy, practice and procedure, including managing incidents and making referrals. A specific course is also available for Early Years DSLs
- "Online Safety (e-Safety) Engaging Children, Young People and Families": This course will focus on resources and educational approaches for both the curriculum and pastoral support. There are specific courses for both secondary and primary schools, including special schools.

A limited number of these courses have been published to establish demand from schools and settings. If you or a member of your staff are interested but are unable to make the dates available then please contact esafetyofficer@kent.gov.uk to register your interest.

e-Safety Ambassador Training

The e-Safety Development Officer is trialling a new programme for upper KS2 pupils to promote peer online safety education in primary schools. This training is currently only available as a bespoke package for schools in local collaborations. Approximately 5 or 6 children from each school will be trained as 'Ambassadors' and will be provided with resources to champion online

New guidance on Sexting

The UK Council for Child Internet Safety's Education Group has produced advice for schools and colleges on responding to incidents of youth produced sexual imagery, otherwise known as 'sexting.' This advice is non-statutory and should be read alongside both Keeping Children Safe in Education 2016 and Searching, screening and confiscation at school guidance 2014.

The guidance, titled 'Sexting in schools and colleges: responding to incidents and safeguarding young people', aims to support DSLs in tackling the range of issues which these incidents present, including:

- Responding to disclosures
- Handling devices and imagery
- Risk assessing situations
- Involving other agencies
- Information about preventative education
- Working with parents
- Reporting imagery to providers.
